WE THREE KINGS BEARING GIFTS

In the Cathedral of Cologne is the Shrine of the Magi, honouring these three travellers from afar. Over the tomb is the great star they followed and images of the gifts they brought, the gold, frankincense and myrrh. But what is the significance of these three visitors? Why did they bring these obscure gifts?

There is a cartoon that goes around at this time of year where the three arrive with their gifts into the stable and Mary looks up and says "Its easy to see you have never had any children – clothes, bottles and nappies would have been more practical gifts!

Like all the images and stories in the scriptures, the Nativity is a great parable but you have to search beyond the immediate situation to see the depth of what we are witnessing. In this the gift of the lamb from the Shepherds and the gold, frankincense and myrrh of the Magi quickly take away the Christmas Card romance of the scene and point us to the destiny of this child. There presence is needed to move us from the baby Jesus wrapped in swaddling clothes to the Saviour wrapped in a shroud before the Resurrection.

It must have troubled Mary's heart to see the gifts they brought. The gold associated with royalty, often made into a crown, a sign of status and wealth. The words of the Passion from St. John's Gospel which we read on Good Friday "Yes I am a king, I was born for this, I came into the world for this." The Frankincense like today is burned during worship as a fragrant offering to God, as the lamb is sacrificed to atone for our sins. At the beginning of Jesus public ministry John the Baptist points to him and says "Behold the Lamb of God". Finally the Myrrh, a beautiful perfume used to anoint the bodies of the dead. We think of the women going to the tomb on that Easter morning with their jars of myrrh and spices to anoint the bruised and battered body of Jesus, only to find the tomb empty and the voice behind them saying "Why do you search among the dead for one who is alive?"

The Magi open our eyes to see beyond the infant lying in the manger and to understand that the message of God coming into the world is
